### **North Side Planting**

It was August 19, 2004, and Karen Haskew, Urban Forestry Coordinator, and I had just finished flagging the locations of some 170 planting spots on Tubbs Hill's north side. We were covered with little brown ocean-spray blossoms. This shrub shares in the thick mix of understory ninebark and snowberry. The spots marked for planting were in tree canopy openings where Douglas-fir has been dying from root rot over the last 30 years.

These openings are also part of the area where trees were salvaged from the November 1996 ice storm. Many of the trees that blew over had roots weakened by rot. Revenue received by the city for these salvaged trees is funding this planting project and other Tubbs Hill management activities. We did not include the areas of nonnative maple (mostly Norway) as part of the planting project, at

this time. Karen and I carried iron rod "walking sticks" sticks to probe the ground to find planting spots between the hidden rocks below. Tubbs Hill was scoured repeatedly some 15,000 to 12,000 years ago by Glacial Lake Missoula Floods. The floods washed way all the soil, and exposed the gneiss and schist bedrock.

Most of the soil on the hill has come from an ash deposit by the Mt. Mazama eruption some 6,500 years ago as well as slowly deposited wind blown soil (loess). The hill got another shot of ash from the Mount St. Helens eruption in May, 1980. The brush cover, which has developed with the exclusion of fire, is continuing to expand in the areas of Douglasfir mortality.

This dense understory is capturing most of the available light, moisture and soil nutrients that are inhibiting the natural (Continued on page 2)

seeding of ponderosa pine from trees on
the ridge. On November 19, 2004, six-foot
circles of brush were cut around each of
the planting spots. Bill Greenwood, Parks
Maintenance Supervisor, provided two
sawyers, and Ken Roberge, Specialty Tree
Services, volunteered himself and another
sawyer for the day.

A crew of Tubbs Hill Committee members worked with the sawyers to throw the cut brush away from the clearings. The orange flags were re-hung to mark each planting spot.

Tree planting was Saturday, April 9. Karen secured two-year old ponderosa pine seedlings from the United States Forest Service Coeur d'Alene Nursery. These trees are from a 2,500 foot elevation seed source which is a good match for the planting area.

Pam Gomes, biology and forestry class teacher at Lake City High School, recruited 10 to 12 students for the planting. The same number of volunteers from the Tubbs Hill Committe formed planting crews with the students.


## Have Your Name Engraved On One Of The Tubbs Hill Monuments
