Progress Being Made on East Side Accessible Trail Plan

The first step towards transforming a portion of the existing East Side Trail on Tubbs Hill into one of ease-of-access has been taken.

The local engineering firm of Welch-Comer recently completed all engineering and design work with the Engineer's opinion of the cost necessary for this project. The changes to the trail will end near the location of the old grandstand between markers 14 and 15, and the cost is projected to be around \$36,000.

Bill Greenwood (Parks Superintendent) and Monte McCully (Trail Coordinator) will be attending a grant workshop on October 24th. It is everyone's hope that the grant they subsequently write will provide the bulk of the funding for this commendable community project. There will probably be some work the Parks Department will be able to do which will cut costs. Different contractors will do the rest.

The Parks Department will be working with the Tubbs Hill Foundation Board every step of the way and will be looking to the Foundation for help with some of the remaining funding.

We wish Bill and Monte all the best as they enter the world of grant writing!
